Prior to 2006, less than 0.01% of the Mississippi population was protected from tobacco smoke by 100% smokefree air laws in indoor public places. Mississippi currently ranks 35th in percent of the population protected from tobacco smoke in indoor public places.

Electronic Cigarettes

Concerns

- Smokers maintaining dependence
- May increase risk of relapse among former smokers
- May frustrate treatment electronic cigarettes are not approved nor incorporated into clinical practice guidelines
- Use among nonsmokers raises concerns about them being at risk for nicotine dependence





2013 Mississippi Social Climate Survey Laws

The age to buy tobacco should be raised to 21.

Agree = 81.8%

Disagree = 18.2%





2013 Mississippi Social Climate Survey Laws

Would you favor or oppose a law in MS that would prohibit smoking in most public places, including workplaces, public buildings, offices, restaurants, and bars?

Favor = 82.1%

Oppose = 14.0%

Neither favor nor oppose = 3.9%





2013 Mississippi Social Climate Survey Restrictions

In residents' apartments and condos: In your opinion, should smoking be allowed...

Yes = 36.3%

No = 63.7%

In indoor common hallways, stairways of apartment or condo buildings: In your opinion, should smoking be allowed...

Yes = 9.2%

No = 90.8%

On private apartments' balconies or patios: In your opinion, should smoking be allowed...

Yes = 56.0%

No = 44.0%

Does your property manager allow smoking in your apartment or condo units?

Yes = 55.7%

No = 44.3%

Does your property manager allow smoking on the property?

Yes = 81.7%

No = 18.3%





2013 Mississippi Social Climate Survey Taxes

Pipe tobacco, smokeless tobacco, and cigars should be taxed at the same rate as cigarettes.

Agree = 88.3%

Disagree = 11.7%





2013 Mississippi Social Climate Survey Taxes

How much additional tax on a pack of cigarettes would you be willing to support?

More than 2 dollars per pack = 25.6% Two dollars per pack = 12.0% One dollar per pack = 10.2% 50 to 99 cents a pack = 4.8% Less than 50 cents a pack = 4.4% No tax increase = 42.9%


Where we are now:






